This project focuses on bridging that gap by studying how trained Neural Network (NN) models can be optimized and deployed on affordable embedded hardware such as microcontrollers and single-board computers. Techniques like model compression, quantization, and hardware-specific optimization are explored to ensure the models can perform fast and accurate predictions in real-time, even with limited resources. The project aims to demonstrate how intelligent decision-making can be brought directly to field devices, enabling smarter, more autonomous systems in areas like environmental monitoring, predictive maintenance, and IoT applications. The student has to train time series models and then deploy them on low platforms such as ESP-32/ R-Pi after performing optimizations in terms of memory and response.
